Glass Artist Cassandria Blackmore designed this piece to honor the grand opening of our Halvorson Reflection Room as a haven for all faiths and all cultures.

Chaplain Dave Wendleton asked for a representation in glass of the Middle Ages Philosophy that our earth is made up of four elements, and Cassandra took that analogy, reverse-painted the glass and then crackled it to symbolize the broken pieces in all of us. We who use the Halvorson Reflection Room understand the allegory and the beauty on both the artistic level and the philosophical level. Cassandria has gone on to become quite a well-known artist nationally and internationally, and we are proud to have her as one of our "Evergreen Artists."



This large oil depiction of Peter Kirk's early home, now the Kirkland Arts Center, is a popular downtown Kirkland landmark. Peter Kirk, the founder of Kirkland, was a wealthy factory owner from England who settled here with his family in the late 1800's. He was involved with early shipping on Lake Washington, as well as many manufacturing pursuits. The town of Kirkland is named for him, and his influence lives on in many ways. This artwork imagines how the street looked in times gone by.

Edward Curtis is one of the most revered early photographers from 1900's America. He left a successful life as a society photographer to live outdoors while photographing the native peoples of the West and Southwest. Publisher Maury Flothe and his wife Sharon donated eight pieces of Edward Curtis' photography to Evergreen to honor the work of the Emergency Department here. During the time that Maury's loaned photographs were hanging in our Silver rotating gallery, he unexpectedly became an emergency patient. "You saved my life, and I want you to have as many photographs as you can handle." Our Emergency Department staff should feel very proud of their legacy as they view the integrity and stamina in the faces of these early portraits.




